Curriculum Information

Yew Class, Autumn Term 2017

English

This term we will be basing much of our work around the Anglo Saxon story of Beowulf. We will study the language and structure of the text in different translations and write our own adventure for this 1200 year old hero. We will also look at discussion and explanation texts in connection with work we are doing in other subjects. We will continue to practise the use of a range of spelling, grammar and punctuation rules and work on incorporating these into our writing. As part of our new Book Club, we will be reading and evaluating the works of Malorie Blackman.

Science

This term we will studying:

* Properties and changes of materials where we will be learning about different materials, their uses and their properties, as well as dissolving, separating mixtures and irreversible changes.

* Animals including humans where we will be learning about the parts and functions of the circulatory system. We will also focus on how nutrients are transported around the human body.

Excitingly, Year 6 will be participating in the Children Challenging Industry Ambassador programme in the second half term which will include work on purifying and extracting materials.

Mathematics

This term we will be concentrating on the following areas of Maths:

- Number: Place Value
- Number: Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division
- Fractions including comparing and ordering fractions, adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing fractions and stating the equivalence between fractions, decimals and percentages.

RE

This term we will be answering the question: Is the Bible a handbook or a story about love? To do this we will be looking at the organisation of the Bible and how it is interpreted by Christians.

We will also be exploring the question: Was Jesus the Messiah?





History

In studying the Anglo Saxons, we will use a wide range of historical skills to help us investigate questions such as: Why did the Anglo Saxons invade and where did they settle? How did people's lives change when Christianity came to Britain? How close did the Vikings get to taking over the country? Just how great was Alfred? Were Saxon times really the dark ages? We will also be visiting West Stow Anglo Saxon village to see how experimental archaeology has improved our understanding of the Anglo Saxons.

Other subjects

Art: We will be exploring the importance of illuminated manuscripts and creating our own Anglo-Saxon inspired illuminated letters.
DT: Designing and creating large scale monsters inspired by Beowulf
Music: Listening to, analysing, composing,

notating and performing music that evokes monsters and battles.

PE: Dance: interpret music, link sequences of movement, create mood.

PSHE: developing the skills of Peer Mediation **Computing:** investigate, design, create, test and modify a model to fit a brief. Record and communicate findings.
