Science

- Research an animal which has adapted to its environment. The more unusual, the better.
- Present your findings on Mary Anning explaining how her discoveries changed our understanding of fossils and evolution.
- Investigate the science and technology used as a part of modern-day forensic investigations
- Use an ink pad to take the fingerprints of your family and friends. Analyse and compare the patterns.

History

- Create a wanted poster for a famous historical villain. Remember to include as much accurate detail about them as you can.
- Draw the designs for or make a model of the perfect prison. It is up to you what "perfect" means in this case. (Impossible to escape from? Best for the prisoners' welfare?)

Mathematics

- Try creating a large 3D shape from unusual materials eg a dodecahedron from marshmallows and cocktail sticks.
- Collect a set of data (eg favourite foods, eye colour, pets) and construct a pie chart to display it.
- Create a Maths puzzle booklet on the theme of a prison breakout.

Art & DT

- Create a sculpture of an animal using media of your own choice (clay, junk, wire).
- Research mandala art and its link to meditation. Create your own mandala design.
- Make a model of a set for our class production of "Forever Treasure Island".
